

Welcome to Denmark!

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, new rules have been introduced on mandatory testing and isolation in connection with your entry into Denmark.

If you are a foreigner and not resident in Denmark or holding a Danish resident permit, you must present a negative COVID-19 test upon arrival at a Danish border by land or sea. All persons entering Denmark – regardless of nationality – must obtain a COVID-19 test within the first 24 hours of being in Denmark.* After entry, all persons entering Denmark must isolate for 10 days.*

When entering Denmark via sea or land borders

Upon entry at the border

You must be able to present a negative COVID-19 test that is no more than 24 hours old at the time of entry (not applicable for Danish citizens and foreigners resident in Denmark or holding a Danish residence permit).

After entry

As a general rule, you must obtain a new rapid test or PCR test no later than 24 hours after entry into Denmark. This also applies if you are able to present a negative test at the time of entry.

3

Isolation

As a general rule, you must isolate for 10 days. This also applies if you are able to present a negative test at the time of entry and after entering.


Breaking isolation

You may break your isolation after obtaining a negative PCR test taken no earlier than on the fourth day after entry.

- Violation of the rules on mandatory testing and isolation after entry is punishable by fine.
- A number of exemptions to the testing and isolation requirements apply.

*Certain groups of persons are exempt from mandatory testing upon arrival. This includes persons who, for medical reasons, should not undergo testing, or persons who were previously infected with COVID-19 (this must be documented with a positive COVID-19 test result that is at least 14 days and no more than twelve weeks old). The mandatory testing requirement also does not apply for children under the age of 15. Certain groups of persons are exempt from the isolation requirement, including Danish citizens and foreigners resident in Denmark or holding a Danish residence permit who enter from Sweden after having been in transit through Sweden to or from Bornholm without having stopped in Sweden.
